Sam's Corner, "A Collection of Disorganized Thoughts"

Hello again my readers. June went by fast, *really* fast. It seems like yesterday that I sat down to write Sam's Corner for the June newsletter and now I'm here again writing July's column. It is hot and steamy here in south Florida, and the rainy season is finally here after a drought of sorts.

The price of gas is starting to come down again, finally. After reaching almost four dollars for regular and over four dollars for premium and diesel, we are ready for some relief. It would be nice if it dropped down to just under two bucks a gallon like it did a few years ago when it spiked to well over four, but I just don't see that happening.

A few weeks ago, I was paying an average of \$3.69 a gallon in my area, which is Sunrise, Florida. One weekday morning, I drove down to the upper Florida Keys to eat

at one of my favorite getaways, "Alabama Jacks." As I reached the end of the Turnpike and arrived in Florida City, I was shocked to discover the gas stations selling gas at about \$3.54 for regular. What the heck is up with that??? Why am I paying fourteen cents more a gallon in Sunrise? The same was true on the "Overseas Highway", where the prices at the gas stations on US1 in Key Largo were hovering at about \$3.55 a gallon for regular.

I tried to analyze this occurrence and turned my friend, "the Internet" for guidance. I did get some insight into this which I will now share with you. Ready? None of it makes sense to me! They say that price fluctuations from one region to another are attributable to taxes, competition, overhead, traffic, prices paid to suppliers, distance from the source, blah, blah, blah...

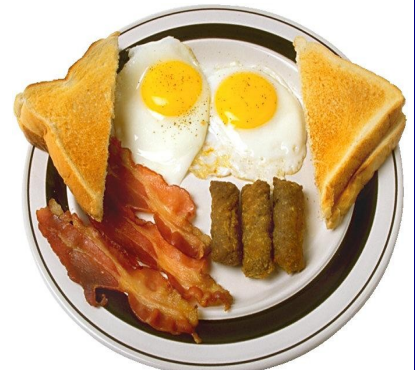
Now in my case, Sunrise is just 15 minutes from Port Everglades, which is where I believe most of the fuel is distributed from in South Florida. The Florida Keys are quite a bit farther than Port Everglades than Sunrise. Doesn't make sense. How about traffic and competition? Is it perhaps because customer traffic is much better in the Keys than it is here and the competition is much more intense? I asked the manager of the Hess Station in North Bay Village how he determines the prices he charges daily for fuel. He said that every day, he has to log in to a secure web site, then he'll take a ride and check out the prices of other local gas stations near the Hess, then he'll determine what the price should be. The Hess station in North Bay Village usually has very good prices.

If Publix has to pay fifty cents more per gallon to fill up their delivery trucks, guess who pays the difference? You know the answer. Life ain't easy for many people, and when the price of gas goes up, many folks suffer for it. I'm not sure what the answer is, but I think part of it is reducing our dependence on foreign oil. I'm sure you've heard that line many times; but I like that.

results of the 343 valid Ballots received are as follows: RICHARD CLEMENTS-240, ROBERT C. ELMORE-117, RICHARD GULLAGE-229, ARTHUR W. MARTINEAU-49, JESS METZGAR-82, JIM NOLAN-156, FELIX ORTEGA-75, GEORGE VARON-49. The following members of the Police Department have been selected as Trustees to the City Pension Fund for Firefighters and Police Officers in the City of Miami Beach for the term commencing July 1, 2011: **RICHARD CLEMENTS, RICHARD GULLAGE, JIM NOLAN**".

At the last General Membership meeting of the Miami Beach Police Retiree's Association held at the Blue Moon Café, there was quite a bit of discussion amongst the membership about candidates who were running for the three available Board of Trustee positions. Up until that point, I didn't realize how difficult the job was, and how much training and experience was needed by a Trustee. So I contacted Celia Locke and asked her to send me some information and what exactly a Trustee is responsible for and what type of training is required. She was kind enough to send me so much material, that it would probably fill two full newsletters. So, I'm going to attempt to summarize for you what is required to be a pension trustee and what their responsibilities entail.

It's not simple. Trustees are just that; we elect them because we trust them with the general administration of our multi-million dollar pension plan. The Police and Fire Pension Board consists of three trustees from the active members of the Police Department, Fire Department, and three trustees appointed by the Mayor from the City Administration. The Board engages professionals and consultants for services that are necessary or required to transact the business of the Pension Fund. The Board must interface and maintain relationships with others, to include an Executive Director, Celia Locke, plan participants, retirees and beneficiaries, legal counsel, investment consultants, performance monitors, consulting actuaries, CPA's, custodians, money

MDCACP MAY 2011 OFFICER OF THE MONTH : DETECTIVE LUIS KING

The MBPD is extremely proud to announce that Detective Luis King has been selected by the Miami-Dade County Association of Chiefs of Police as their May 2011 Officer of the Month for the integral role he played in the international organized crime case known as the Beach Caviar investigation. This was a joint FBI and MBPD operation which resulted in 17 Federal Indictments for violating Title 18, US Code 1349, Conspiracy. The conspiracy involved attractive Eastern European women luring wealthy men into private nightclubs in Miami Beach and then charging them exorbitant rates for liquor. The resulting fraudulent credit charges were processed by a company owned and operated by their organization. Detective King played a vital undercover role in this investigation posing as a corrupt cop who was employed as a bouncer/doorman to handle any police related issues if their customers refused to pay their bills.

Detective King spent approximately eight months as the organization's "enforcer". He was such a part of this crime family that the operation to arrest the 17 subjects was orchestrated around the premise that it was Detective King's birthday and the group came together to celebrate his birthday. This conveniently placed all the subjects in the same location to safely affect their arrests.

Through Detective King's extraordinary dedication, commitment, and courage, a major Eastern European crime organization was dismantled and leads were obtained to pursue organized crime investigations against Russian groups in New York, Los Angeles, and Chicago. It is of tremendous significance to note, this is the third consecutive month that this prestigious award has been won by MBPD personnel. This is an amazing and unprecedented feat by the Police Department, especially in light of the fact that they are competing against approximately forty other law enforcement agencies every month for this award.

managers, state and local governing authorities, stockbrokers, and a medical board.

The main functions and major responsibilities of the Board of Trustees is to establish investment policy and procedure, adopt actuarial standards, approve methods for internal reporting and control, and insure overall compliance with appropriate governing conditions. The Board is also required to be aware of things such as "fiduciary status", "prudent person, expert, and investor rules", and "insulation from potential liability."

The training required to become a Certified Public Pension Trustee includes a school put on by the Florida Public Pension Trustees Association. It is a three course program. There is also an annual conference and additional training provided by the professionals and consultants employed by the board in areas such as investments, actuarial, and legal matters. I was told it takes about a year to figure it all out, and get comfortable with it.

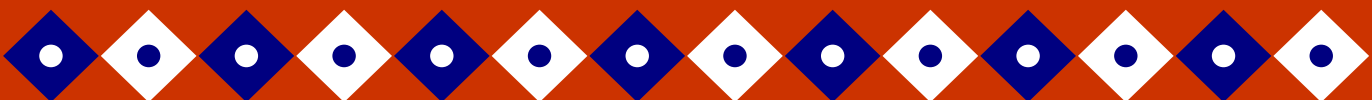
At a recent board meeting, Chairman Butler, who is officially now retired was presented with a plaque in recognition

for his dedicated service as Chairman from July, 2009 to June, 2011, and Trustee from September, 2006 to June, 2011 made the following comments:

"It was an honor to serve on the Board. We have a sacred trust that is not to the FOP or the IAFF or the City. It's to the fund and all the members and their beneficiaries that are going to depend on this pension fund. I take great pride in all the energy and time the Board members put into the fund.
